Parent and Carers Guide to Apprenticeships



What is an Apprenticeship?

- Your young person will be out in the world of work, working for an employer, earning a wage, and learning new skills.
- Your young person will work at least 30hours per week, including training towards a recognised qualification, (linked to a specific career), which makes up 20% of the apprenticeship.
- Apprentices have a formal contract of employment with the employer (including holiday pay etc), and are treated in the same way as other members of staff.
- Apprenticeships vary in length, on average taking 1 to 4 years to complete.



Student = The Apprentice

There is a three way partnership at the core of a successful Apprenticeship



School / College = Training Provider Place of work = Employer

As with school or college, your young person can study varying apprenticeship levels depending on prior knowledge and qualifications. Therefore, it is not uncommon for a student to complete their A Levels and enroll on an intermediate or advanced apprenticeship. Students over the age of 16 can apply for an apprenticeship but each role will have different entry requirements.

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


Higher and Degree Apprenticeships

- A combination of studying for a university degree (tuition fees paid by the employer) and direct hands-on experience in the workplace. This pathway may take longer than a traditional degree to complete.
- There are over 100 companies, partnered with over 20 universities, offering Degree Apprenticeships. Applications are made directly to the employer and can be advertised all year round.
- Your young person will be treated as an employee, earning at least the apprentice's minimum wage from the outset.
- Students can apply for an apprenticeship at the same time as university and decide what is right for them at a later point.

What can you earn?

Apprentices aged 16—18 or 19+ and in the first year of an Apprenticeship will earn the minimum apprenticeship wage. However, it is worth remembering that many employers will pay above the minimum., advertising apprenticeships with a 'competitive salary.'

Top Tips if your young person is applying for an Apprenticeship:

- Research and preparation is key. Explore Work Experience options with your young person to help them get a feel for the sector.
- Remind your young person that they must apply for Apprenticeships separately, just like applying for a job. A strong CV will be essential to help your young person secure a good apprenticeship. You could help them to complete a skills audit and jot down scenarios where they showcased these skills.
- Remind your young person that recruitment for Apprenticeships may be earlier than expected. It is not unusual for vacancies aimed at school leavers to be advertised the previous Autumn.
